2021 Hall of Fame Class Inductees

The next class of athletes, relay, coaches, pioneers, and contributors will be Inducted June 19 at a ceremony in Terre Haute the home of the Indiana Track & Field and Cross Country Hall of Fame and Museum. See sponsorship details later in this publication. The 2021 Class of Inductees includes:

Girl Athletes Tori Bliss



Class of 2011, Tori Bliss amassed four IHSAA state titles in the shot put (2009-2011) and discus (2010) during her prep career. Her 2011 state finals put (50' 9") set the state record and helped Bliss become the 2011 recipient of the Robert S. Hinshaw Mental Attitude Award. She was named the 2010 -2011 Indiana Gatorade Girls Track & Field Athlete of the Year after successfully defending her New Balance Nationals shot put championship title and setting a new personal best (50'9.5"). Her personal best in the shot put and discus (148' 2") were both set during her senior year.

After concluding a distinguished prep career, Bliss extended her throwing

career at Louisiana State University (LSU). She became LSU's most decorated shot putter earning three NCAA Division I All-American honors and two All-Southeastern Conference honors, including a 2015 SEC Indoor Championship title and meet-record throw (60' 1"). In addition, she was named to the 2015 SEC Community Service Team as a senior and currently holds LSUs indoor (60' 7") and outdoor (60'8") shot put school records.

Hannah Farley Park Tudor



Hannah Farley graduated from Park Tudor High School in Indianapolis in 2009. She is a three-time state champion in the 400-meter dash, in 2006, as a freshman, Farley shocked the field by winning her first state championship after coming in as a fifth seed. In 2007, she continued her streak in the 400 while also adding the 200meter dash, where she placed third. In 2008, she competed in the 400, 200, and 4x400-meter relay, placing first, second, and sixth, respectively. As a senior in 2009, Hannah competed in four events at the State Meet. She placed second in the 400, and third in the 100, 200, and 4x400 relay. Park Tudor placed third overall in the state that year. Hannah was awarded the IHSAA Mental Attitude Award her senior year and was selected as Marion County Female Athlete of the Year. Her high school personal records include 54.31 in the 400, 24.80 in the 200, and 12.35 in the 100. She holds school records in all three events at Park Tudor, as well as in the 4x400-meter relay and the 4x800-meter relay.

Farley went on to compete for Stanford University in college. In 2011, she qualified for the NCAA Division I West Regional in the 400meter dash and was selected as a Mountain Pacific Sports Federation All-Academic Scholar Athlete.

Since college, Farley has hung up her spikes, but coaches track and field and cross country at the school where she teaches physical education. She also found a passion for body building and started competing in 2018. She won her first two competitions competing in the figure category and aspires to go pro in natural bodybuilding.

Boy Athletes Brandon Pounds Lawrence North




Brandon graduated from Lawrence North High School in 2008, where he produced one of the farthest shot put throws in Indiana history. His winning throw of 68' 11.25" made him the Nike Outdoor National Champion in the shot put.

After Lawrence North, Brandon continued his track and field career at Indiana State University, where he had the pleasure of training under Coach Adam Judge. While at ISU, Pounds suffered an injury to his right wrist that ended his opportunity to continue in the shot put; however, he pushed to learn the weight and hammer events. During his time at ISU, he was a 4-time NCAA Championship Qualifier and a 2time NCAA All-American. He holds both of ISU's records; 22.55 meters (73'11.75") for the weight throw and 65.58 meters (215' 2") for the hammer. He holds a Bachelor of Science degree from ISU as well.

After his college career, Pounds returned to Indianapolis, Indiana and was part of the Warren Central High School girls coaching staff that claimed the IHSAA Track and Field State Championship in 2016 and 2017. Pounds is honored to join the ranks of so many great Indiana athletes, and is humbled by this induction and forever grateful to be afforded the opportunity.

Curt Carey Owen Valley



Curt Carey the son of a veteran distance runner Carl Carey, Carl was on the winning 1954 Indianapolis Shortridge High School cross country team and placed 16th in the Worlds Veteran Championships in Glasgow, Scotland. Carl got Curt running at an early age and at thirteen Curt could keep up with the pack in most ten milers until the later miles.

Curt continued running every road race in travel distance. One coach said that he would see him ten or more miles from home and he was sure that he would run to return. Curt's training diary showed 120 – 140 mile a week was not uncommon. The high school coaching staff at South Putnam High School looked forward to him joining their team. However, Curt's family moved to the neighboring Owen Valley school system in his freshman year, .and he ran in the years of the tough southern Indiana cross country competition.

He won the 1980 IHSAA State Cross Country Meet in record time and 80 yards ahead of the runner-up, as it was the first IHSAA 5000-meter championship, defeating future NCAA All-Americans and an Olympic participant. His record was predicted to be broken the next year but escaped by .7 seconds and for the next eleven years no winner came close to Curt's winning mark on the South Grove layout and although the championships have change sites. He still holds the fastest winning time in an IHSAA Championship Meet.

Late in the fall of 1980, Curt won the Regional 6 and National Age Group AAU Championship. At the Regional 6 Meet, the University of West Virginia's Coach Hatfield offered him a scholarship and remarked that he had never seen a smoother runner. Then at the National Meet in Cheyenne, Wyoming, he won by 28 seconds in 15:46.2 on a course that was said to be nearly impossible to break sixteen minutes.

Curt took his talents and ran at Purdue University and University of Southern Indiana.

His real joy in running came on the roads and ultra-long-distance races.

Relay Team 1980 4 x 400m Relay Gary West Walter Monagan-Brown Kenneth Carter Craig Peterson Sortero Burnett



Gary West Side 4x 400 relays have been the dominate relay since the IHSAA went metric in 1980 and for 41 years they have held the IHSAA State Meet record of 3:13.66. Only two other teams have broken the 3:15 mark (Center Grove 2011 and Hamilton Southeastern 2013).

Kenneth Carter

Carter started his track career with the Mayor Hatcher Youth Foundation (AAU) during the summer of his 14th year, running the 600 meters. At West Side High School, he ran the 400 meter and 4x 400 relay, ultimately being named All-American. His talent led to a full scholarship in track and field to Prairie View A&M. After his collegiate career running in meet hosted by the NAIA, SWAC, Texas Relays and others, Carter now resides in Houston, Texas enjoying BBQing.

Craig Peterson

After is stardom career at Gary West High School, Peterson served in the United States Air Force. He earned a Batchelor of Science degree in Business Management from the University of Maryland and a Master of Arts degree in Human Science & Counseling from Liberty University. The foundation of his life is faith and family. The induction into the Indiana Track and Field Hall of Fame is not only recognition of personal achievement, but embodiment of what his family taught.

Walter Monagan-Brown

After four IHSAA championships, 1979 4x220, '80 4x400, and '81 400 and 4x400 and a second in 1980 400, Walter would win the 1981 AAU National Junior Olympic in Winston-Salem, North Carolina in 46.93. He was a high school All-American in both his junior and senior years. Walter took his talents to Louisiana Tech University for a year, then to Parkland Junior College and to Texas Southern University. During his collegiate career he had the honor of running against the best the united had Carl Lewis, Herschel Walker, etc.

Sortero Burnett

Sortero was known for his relay participant. As a sophomore, he ran on the IHSAA state champion 4x220 and a third place 4x440 and in 1980 he ran on both the 4x200 and 4x400 championship relays. After graduating, Sortero attended Prairie View A&M University.

<u>Coach</u> Tim Richey Lawrence Central



Tim Richey graduated from Tri-Central High School in 1981. His participation in AAU meets cultivated a love for track and field. He credits his coaching success to three influential mentors, his high school coach Clark Chambers (Tri-Central, North Miami, and Huntington North), Bloomington South coach Larry Williams and Lawrence Central coach Mike Holman.

Tim learned how to build a winning track and field program from Coach Chambers in high school and was able to revisit those early lessons in later years.

Richey student taught at Bloomington South under Coach Williams, who had state champion caliber vaulters and jumpers in his program that first year. Williams remained one of Richey's mentors during his whole career.


After coaching basketball at various levels for 10 years, Coach Richey took the helm of the boys and girls track and field teams at White River Valley. Soon, there were 95 kids in grades 6 – 12 roaming the track, with one assistant coach. Richey's experiences with the Indiana Track Club at Indiana University were vital to his success building the WRV program and becoming a better coach.

While at WRV, Richey had four athletes earn state championships medals, including three-time state champion, one-time runner-up and five-time All-American pole vaulter Matt Campbell (16'9").

Coach Richey's next move was to Lawrence Central as an assistant to Mike Holman from 2002 – 2009. The coaching experiences he had with Mike were a critical part of Richey's success along the way. In 2009, Richey became the head girls coach at Lawrence Central and in 2012 he became the boys head coach. The girls were state champions in 2010 and 2014 and runners-up in 2013. The boys were state champions in 2012. One of the highlights of his time at LC was watching his girls become the Marion County champs for five consecutive years, 2010 to 2014. His boys' team was ranked #2 in the state in 2020.

Richey has coached six state champion pole vaulters, including the very first female state champion in the event, Tori Allen, in 2003. LC has been honored with four All-American vaulters and a national champion in Kimyanna Rudolph (13'2.5") in 2012. Tim Richey has had an incredibly blessed career with great coaching mentors and student-athletes to learn alongside.

Contributor Steve Cotherman East Central



Steve Cotherman graduated from Goshen High School in 1968, where he ran cross country, track and played basketball. Influenced by high school coach Dean Slavens, Steve attended Ball State University and ran cross country and track from 1969 – 1972.

Upon graduation from Ball State, Cotherman was hired as a physical education instructor on the elementary level in the Sunman-Dearborn School Corporation. Transferring to East Central High School in 1978, Steve became the assistant boys coach in 1979 and was the head boys track coach from 1980 until 2016. He also took over as head girls coach in 2003 -2016.

As boys track coach, his teams totaled 51 invitational championships, 19 conference titles, 19 sectional championships and had 23 individual and five relay state qualifiers, including two individual state champions. His girls teams won 21 invitationals, 12 conference titles, 13 sectional championships and had 10 individual and 11 relay state qualifiers.

Cotherman became the head boys and girls high school cross country coach at East Central in 1981. During his tenure, the combined boys and girls accomplishments include: 52 invitational championships, 12 conference titles, four sectional championships and one statequalifying individual girl in successive state finals.

Cotherman became active in the IATCCC in 1990, being named the sectional representative for his area. He served as vice-president and president of the association. After helping with the track all-star meet while it was held in Indianapolis, Cotherman became an assistant coach for the Indiana men's team for three years and the head coach seven years. From there he became the men's team coordinator from 2007 – 2016.

Cotherman serves on the Indiana Track and Field Clinic committee and has been awarded the IATCCC President's Appreciation Award. He also earned the IATCCC Longevity Award for 40 years of coaching in Indiana.

He has received the Ball State Alumni Coach of the Year Award in cross country and track.

Pioneers Steve Cooksey Terre Haute Gerstmeyer



"Words cannot adequately describe the impact and influence Coach Cooksey has had on our Midshipmen, the Academy and the sport of Track & Field over his unparalleled career," Director of Athletics Chet Galadchuk said. "He is 'an icon' in our profession and one of the most universally recognized and appreciated educators within our coaching and faculty ranks. Coach has been one of a kind, the best at everything he does. A professional role model personified, and a man who always exudes the highest values of character, integrity and competitive spirit."

Under his watch, Navy compiled an overall dual meet record of 353 wins – 48 loss while earning 14 Patriot League team titles nine Indoor Championships and five Outdoor Championship with over 450 All Patriot League Honorees. Additional, Navy won the Heptagonal outdoor competition three straight years from 1991 – 1993 and posted back-to-back wins in the Heptagonal Indoor Championship in 1992 and 1993. The team also captured the Colonial Athletic Association crown during the 1991 season.

Cooksey's success also carried over into Navy's Star Meet competitions against archrival Army, where his teams own a 37-21 career mark against the Black Knights. Over the last 17 years, the team won 23-of-34 dual meets competitions against Army, including nine indoor and outdoor sweeps.

"I tell the kids over and over, you can't just all of a sudden make it happen," Cooksey added. "You have to put the time in, work and be patient. There has got to be some hard work and some sacrifice. If you do that, you have a greater chance of getting the job done and obtaining your goals,"

Cooksey arrived in Annapolis in 1984 and retired in August 2017.

As an associate professor in the physical education department, he was twice the recipient of the Superintendent's Distinguished Athletic Leadership Award.

Before coming to Navy, Cooksey was the head cross-country and track and field coach at Ball State University where he began as an assistant in 1974. During his time at Ball State, Cooksey worked with 18 NCAA qualifiers, three All-Americans and an NCAA champion.

In 1998, he was named the head coach for the United States World Junior Championship team and has served as a coach on several other U.S. National teams. Most recently, Cooksey served as the head coach of the 2008 U.S. World Indoor Championship team.

His road to becoming one of the top collegiate track coaches began in Terre Haute, Indiana where he grew up. He was a Gerstmeyer HS graduate, member of the track team and received a scholarship to Indiana State University. He was a national-ranked high jumper, two-time captain, and team MVP for the ISU program. Cooksey enjoyed a decorated athletic career for the Sycamores, collecting a list of individual accolades, including NCAA All-American and U.S. Track & Field Federation All-American Honors. He was inducted into the ISU Hall of Fame in 2004.

Dru Cox-Pearcy Plainfield



Dru (Cox) Pearcy is a 1977 graduate of Plainfield (Indiana) High School. While there, she was a four-year multi-sport, varsity letter holder. The first Mid-State Conference girls track championship was held in 1975, and Cox was conference champion in the softball throw the first three years of the event. As a freshman, she placed 6th in the First Annual IHSAA softball throw. She came away with the two conference championships in the shot put her junior and senior years. In 1977, her 440-yard relay team won the conference meet as well.

Cox won four Sectional, four Regional and three State Championships in the Softball Throw. From 1975 to 1977, she was undefeated in the softball throw and shot put during the regular season. In 1977, she finished 7th at the state meet in the shot put but won her third consecutive state title in the softball throw, setting a still-standing record of 239 feet.

Being a multi-sport athlete, Cox chose to pursue basketball after high school, going on to play at Indiana State University. She was a Parade All-American in Basketball and was honored to play on the second annual Girls All-Star Team her senior year. Cox was inducted into the Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame in 2004.

Dru Cox continues to live in Plainfield, Indiana.

Larry Cuzzort Evansville Central



Short and skinny, Larry Cozzort often trailed the rest of the field by 50 yards or more as a freshman at Evansville Central High School.

"He always came in last in distance races" said Jon Siau, then assistant at Evansville North High School and later became the head coach.

But Cuzzort grew into his role, helping usher in a golden era of dominant Southern Indiana Athletic Conference long-distance runners. "He just got into it." Siau said. He went on to become an All- American at Western Kentucky University. He set the tone for (local) elite runners.

"Larry was so gracious" said Adam Renfro, who followed in Cuzzort's footstep in distance-running excellence. "He returned to Central High School several times to host training camps for us. He wrote me numerous times while I was in high school, encouraging me to ... well break his records. He also helped WKU recruit me, but I ultimately went to Indiana University."

"But to watch Larry run ... man, the guy was poetry. Efficient is not the right word. Beautiful is what he was. Every race a poem" continued Renfro.

A 1976 Central graduate, Cuzzort set the school one- and two-mile records. He was a four-time NCAA Division 1 All-American (two in cross country and one in the indoor 2-mile and one in the outdoor 5.000 meter) at WKU. In 1979 and 1980, Cuzzort was named the Ohio Valley Conference Men's Cross-Country Athlete of the Year while also earning OVC Indoor Track and Field Athlete of the Year and OVC All-Half Century Track and Field team honors.


Running for Mason-Dixon AC in 1980, Cuzzort was on a team that won the United States Cross Country Championship. In 1982, he ran 7:52.74 in the 3,000 meters. Larry would go on to run professionally for the famous Sub 4 Track Club, where he set the American 15K road record.

It all began with Cuzzort, who set the tone.

After graduating from WKU with a degree in Computer Science, Cuzzort had a successful career in Information Technology.

Cornell Garrett Evansville North



Standing only 5' 9" and weighting in at one-hundred and thirty pounds as a senior Cornell Garrett easily stood head and shoulders above the competition and his accomplishments outweighed those of the city's best. In track "Nell" was virtually unbeatable. Recording Evansville best-ever times in the 100-yard dash (9.7) and the 220-yard dash (21.2) Garrett dominated the area track scene. He was a three-time track state finalist in the 100 and 220 and anchored the 1977 state finalist 880-yard relay team. In that race he took the baton and passed four opponents to lead the Huskies to a fifth-place finish. But individually, he was a shine. During his junior year, Garrett placed second in the 100 and prepared to run his specialty, the 220. As any

one of the thousand onlookers can attest, it was Garrett's race from the start. As he left the curve and entered the straightaway, he had a ten-yard lead over the state's best. His time of 21.3 tied the existing state record. Head Coach George Alvey stated, "No one ran the curve better than Cornell... he was smooth as silk and a great competitor."

Along the way, Garrett amassed numerous city and conference titles and was selected as All-State and All-American.

Upon graduating from North, Garrett accepted a track scholarship to attend Louisiana Tech University. Cornell best times in college were 10.25 (100 meters), 20.48 (200 meters) and 46.5 (400 meters). Highlights in college include being a three-time participant in the NCAA Division 1 Track and Field Championships and a national fifth place finisher in the 200 meters as a senior. Cornell was invited to the 1980 Olympic Trials, but the United State boycotted the Moscow Olympics that year. Cornell won five individual conference titles and was named the 1981 Conference Championships Track Athlete of the Year. During his four years at Louisiana Tech, Cornell had the honor of running alongside the greats, such as Hershel Walker (Georgia) Willie Gault (Chicago Bears), and Olympic champions Carl Lewis and Al Joyner. "Nell" also was ranked in the top twenty in the world for the 200 meters. He holds a bachelor's degree and resides in Evansville.

What is new at the Museum?
